# An Open Letter to the Sailing Community about Safety

From: Jack Gierhart, CEO of US Sailing

Dear Sailors,

As many of you are aware, the sailing community experienced several tragic incidents on the water over the past several months that have impacted the broader boating community around the county and the entire marine industry. All of us at US Sailing – our staff, Board of Directors, and volunteers – are deeply saddened by these tragedies. Our thoughts go out to affected families and communities as they navigate through these very difficult times. We will look to assist these sailing communities as they assess the accidents, and work together to prevent incidents like this in the future.

Our commitment to safety is paramount at US Sailing. We endeavor to advance safety in our sport by reviewing and improving current best practices in safety procedures, protocol and equipment through advanced innovation, and education. We will continue to champion the many positive lessons and opportunities that sailing offers, while striving to ensure sailing remains as safe as possible.

Through it all, sailing remains one of the safest water-based recreational activities. Sailing accounts for an extremely small percentage of the total boating accidents and an even smaller portion of the fatalities. A lot of this has to do with the fact that safety, and respect for the weather and waters, have always been a priority for sailors. See the U.S. Coast Guard Recreational Boating Statistics Report for 2016 (Pages 48-51).

These incidents should not dampen our passion nor discourage people from participating, but rather serve as reminders and impress upon all of us the importance of diligence as we plan, organize and participate in upcoming events.

Over the years, <u>US Sailing has conducted several independent reviews of sailing accidents</u>. Most of these reviews come at the request of the U.S. Coast Guard and were conducted by panelists assembled from US Sailing's Safety at Sea Committee focused on improving safety guidelines for racing, communication between sailors and race organizers, and training for race officials running offshore races.

Our engagement with various state and federal government initiatives to legislate safety has reinforced the importance of achieving a balance between education and regulation. Education, resources and awareness coupled with a balanced and intelligent legislative strategy, is going to deliver the best results and keep sailing as safe as possible.

HSC is set to kick off the year with the full host of sail classes. Whether your new to the club or around for a bit think about giving yourself or someone you know the chance to learn more about the sport we all love. It's a great opportunity to get out on the water to pick up the basics or build your confidence and get on the race course. Our schedule has something for everyone:

Youth Learn to Sail (YLS) classes are offered for children 11 yrs and older and run from 9:00-4:00 each day. The week is split into 2 parts and can be taken separately or together. The YLS 1 is run with two kids to a boat so one child can focus on sail trim while the other focuses on handling the tiller. After taking the first class children can continue with YLS 2 with one child per boat combining the skills built in the first class. In the past we have had children, grandchildren and nieces and nephews of club members join in this great week of fun on the water. It's a wonderful way to create memories and a lifelong love of sailing.

Why should the kids have all the fun? HSC has adult classes for beginner sailors and those interested in beginning to race. So those family members, friends, or co-workers that always seems interested in your adventures but might need a place to start can join the fun and you'll get credit for lighting the spark. The adult class schedule was created to fit your work schedule and are run Friday evenings, all day Saturday and Sunday mornings prior to the weekly afternoon races. # **Force 5 Midwinter Championships**

For those who have never seen a short rig Force 5, this picture of your editor will help understand the content below.

I arrived in Key Largo on Sunday, Feb. 18, for a three-day regatta that started on Thursday, Feb. 22. The folks at the Upper Keys Sailing Club welcome early arrivals, and plan activities for every day. The wind forecast for the week was 15-25 mph every day. I don't recall much of the 15 mph later than 10-11 in the morning or earlier than 6 pm in the afternoon. It felt like 20-30 to me. Hence, I never unrolled my full rig sails.



The first actual racing event was on Tuesday and is called the Race to Nest Key, an island about 6 miles from the club. Upon arrival at Nest Key, you beach your boat and enjoy some rum punch before heading back. I had to pass up on the event this year, as I was taking my wife to the airport before the time when I might get back. Below are some pictures of the bedlam at the start.







Wednesday was part practice and then the annual "Doubles Championship." Last year's winners got off to a bad start when their mast snapped at the start. My "practice" included 2 capsizes, one of which was caused by my tiller extension separating from the tiller.

Thirty-nine sailors were registered. Of that number, 37 had registered in the full rig fleet with just 2 in the short rig fleet. During Thursday morning's final registration, 11 more sailors (including me) opted for the short rig fleet. With age come wisdom.

Three races were held on Thursday afternoon. Lots of excitement. Four races on Friday, and I opted for a DNS after the third. Two more on Saturday.

The Executive Team of HSC is delighted to announce that we will offer US Sailing's First Sail Program here on Spruce Run Reservoir. The core of our mission at HSC is to share the sport of sailing with the community. The First Sail Program is a great way to accomplish that by providing a memorable 2 hour on-the-water experience of sailing without having to make a commitment to the sport. We hope this one-time experience will inspire newcomers to the sport, or to help our friends, neighbors and family members to experience and appreciate our enthusiasm for sailing.

First Sail is a nationwide initiative developed by US Sailing with support from sailing schools, community sailing centers, yacht clubs and other sailing industry organizations around the United States. The goal of First Sail is to educate the public on the benefits of sailing as a fun and exciting recreational activity and sport for people of all ages and abilities and connect them with opportunities to get involved. This is a perfect program for HSC to offer in support of our community.

HSC will offer the First Sail experience in Flying Scots. The program is a condensed introduction to sailing with just enough classroom 'chalk talk' to convey the principles of sailing and parts of the sailboat, followed by and hour or so of sailing on Spruce Run. There is usually a \$25 - \$50 fee for this program. Since HSC is a community not-for-profit organization we will ask for a donation of \$25 per participant.
