Commodore's Corner – Mark Kaplan

It has certainly been a slow start to the season. As of the writing of this article, we have just had our first Sunday of racing. Between rain, light winds, and very high winds, it has been difficult to get out. A few adventurous souls did head out on some Scots on one of the windier Sundays, only to high tail it back to the beach to avoid a very cold swim! Lets hope for improved weather for the rest of the season.

Our equipment is certainly ready to go. Robert and Nick Reyes have done an outstanding job getting our sunfish in great shape. Excellent fiberglass work has them looking great and newly installed bumper guards should keep them that way for years to come. Thanks to the rear Commodore Angelo Lovisa and some volunteers, new permanently mounted VHF radios in SWW, Chase 1, and the shed are working great. The radios are never missing, never have dead batteries, and sound loud and clear. The new SWW has turned out to be a great choice. The boat is much faster than the old boat, so setting up and retrieving a course has never been easier.

This last Sunday was also our first picnic day (the day formally known as Hot Dog Sunday). Healthy choices like veggie burgers were most appreciated. We hope that you come out and socialize on our

scheduled picnic days. Email reminders will be sent out.

HSC will hold its 48th annual Commodore's Cup Regatta on Saturday, June 11th. This regatta was established in 1969 to find the outstanding skipper in the Hunterdon Sailing Club.

Note that any sailboat is eligible to participate in the Commodore's Cup, not just our official fleet boats. The regatta is a handicap race rather than one design, which means all boats start at the same time and



the finishing times are adjusted based on a rating for the particular boat type. The winner will be the boat with the smallest adjusted time. This allows different boat types to compete with each other on an even basis. If a fast design and a slow design are sailed equally well, they should finish with equivalent adjusted times.

So even if you are first across the line, don't pop open the bubbly just yet!

Ratings can come from several sources. We will use the Portsmouth Rating system (described in the HSC Handbook and also available online).

There will be refreshments at 10:15am, Skippers' meeting will be at 11:00am and we will start before Noon.

Bring your favorite (does not have to be your fastest!) boat and crew to join us for the Commodore's Cup on Saturday, June 11th.

RACE COMMITTEE SKILLS:

How to Use the Anchor.

The basic idea for setting a anchor, such as the Danforth anchors used on HSC's pontoon boat and skiffs, is to drag it across the bottom so the pointed flukes tip over and dig into the mud on the bottom. Ideally, and especially in heavy winds, you want the anchor to hold by digging itself into the mud, not by the sheer weight of anchor and chain on the end of the line. Before you do anything, make sure the opposite end (the "bitter end") of the anchor line is tied or cleated to the boat prevent losing everything overboard.

Anchoring is accomplished by motoring the pontoon boat into the wind about 100 feet or four boat lengths past the place you'd like to position the anchored boat--more if you think the water is deep. Place the motor in reverse and move slowly astern at a walking pace. Release the anchor chain from the hook and lower it steadily and quickly to the bottom, being careful not to get a rope burn. Do not just dump it with the boat stationary. As the boat moves astern, let out the anchor line until it is pointing more forward than down. Then put the tail of the line around the anchor cleat to create some drag. Slowly increase the drag on the line, and you should feel the anchor dig in and bring the boat to a halt. If it doesn't, let out more line and try again. Convention says the length "scope" of the anchor line and chain should be 7 or 8 times the depth of the water.

Recovering a well-set anchor sometimes requires more than just muscle power. Start the



engine so it is ready to go. Use the anchor line to pull the boat forward over the anchor and draw the line tight and vertical. If it's windy, you can motor forward slowly. If the anchor remains stuck on the bottom, cleat the line and slowly motor forward over the anchor. The action of pulling it forward should release it from

the bottom. Then stop the boat and pull up the anchor and put one of the chain links over the hook to secure it.

(Fig 1) Moving the boat in reverse as the anchor hits the bottom helps it to tip over and dig into the mud.



(Fig 2) Five feet of heavy anchor chain helps keep the anchor flat on the bottom of the lake so the pointed flukes can dig into the mud to hold the boat.

News from the Rear Commodore

VHF radios have been installed on the See Which Won, Safety 1 and in building. A handheld VHF radio with charger will be in an "ammo box" on Safety 2. Placards will be added by each radio with operating instructions. As always, in the event of an emergency dial 911 and the park police at 877-927-6337.

Two main points when using the radios are:

- 1) Turn on radio when leaving and select channel 68 when departing in case the shed needs to contact the boats.
- 2) Turn the squelch knob clockwise until static is heard and the slowly counterclockwise until the static goes away.
- 3) Turn off the radios when done with the boats.

Two deck chocks have been added to the SWW's bow for mooring. When mooring the SWW, guide the line through the chock and then around the outside of each cleat before cinching the line with a half hitch. The chocks help prevent the line from abrading.

1964-2016 – 52 Year Partnership

A primer for new members and a reminder for the rest of us.

For 52 years, we've had a mutually beneficial partnership (the only kind) with a part of our New Jersey Government. We've been their best customers, the ones who offer to help clean up the park, the ones who have started a tree planting program and frequently rescue boaters in need. They allow us to keep our shed on the property, make a building available for training lectures and keep on hiring Park Superintendents who listen to our concerns and work closely with us so that we all succeed. For the past several years, as HSC's liaison with the park staff, I've had the privilege of working with Joe, Becky, Jenny and Jason. They have all been the best of what we hope for in public workers. I and other club members also work with the several state law enforcement staff assigned to our park.

Like any partnership, we need to understand each other's needs and concerns and work to address them. The park staff holds up their side of that deal. So once in awhile I like to write about the park's concerns so that we can all be a part of the partnership.

Part of the role of the law enforcement folks is to maintain safety and some sense of order in the boat storage/rigging/parking areas and the road leading in. Here are some issues that I often hear of from them: 1. Observe the stop signs 2. Observe the speed limit on the road to the launch area – we share that space with walkers, runners, cyclists and lots of animals. This year, we've been hearing more about parking. Keep these guidelines in mind: The boat parking area is for boats, the car parking area is for cars. Your car may be in the boat parking area only while loading, unloading, rigging and launching. If you leave your car there while having lunch at the shed, walking to the rest rooms, etc., you are risking a ticket. One of the park officers expressed particular concern about the crowd of cars in the "loop" on busy race days, as they make it difficult for anyone to drive through the area. And please don't leave your car sitting in the middle of the launch area.

Have a good summer, and address your concerns with the park to me please.

July 4th ADVICE

Some advice for coming to the park: Do not try to beat the crowd. July 4th is the busiest day of the year at Spruce Run, and there will be a line forming early in the morning, with the park closing the beach area as soon as the parking lots are full. If you arrive at 10:00 or later and tell the park staff that you are going to the boating area



for a sailing club regatta and picnic, you should have no problem.

The park superintendent suggests bringing something "boat like", such as an oar, PFD or even a canoe or kayak on the roof, or a boat on a trailer. Bring your boat storage tag, if you have one. Make it clear that you are a HSC member. Be patient with the park staff. They will be having a busy day!
