ANN SANTORIELLO FUN DAY - AUGUST 19

The annual Sam Nelson Regatta will be held in the morning of August 19. This regatta is open to junior members of the club and includes anyone who took the youth sail training this year as well as anyone else in the club under 18. The skippers meeting will be at 10:00 with the first race starting as soon as possible afterwards. There will be a series of three modified triangles sailed in Sunfish. The winner of this series will receive the Sam Nelson award for outstanding junior skipper. The Walter C. Finne award will go to the highest placing midget (under 15) (years not inches) in the series. YES! You can win both the Sam Nelson award the Walter C. Finne award in the same race! After the Sam Nelson Regatta there will a pot luck picnic a la the 4th of July. The more who come the merrier! The picnic is planned to begin around noon, depending on when the Sam Nelson is over. Again contact Susan Mallows regarding this event.

Then, at 2:00 the Ladies Regatta will be held. This regatta has been open only to the Ladies of the club in past years. However, for the year 2000, the gender requirements have been modified. The regatta is open to all ladies, juniors and all men dressed as women. Wide latitude will be given for dressing criteria, although awards will be given to the best cross dressers. Any boat may participate. Any combination of skippers and crew will be allowed. The regatta will consist of a series of 3 races as described below:

Egg Race

LeMans start boats are placed on the launching beach, but unrigged. (Boats in their usual partial rigged state that are left at Spruce Run do not have to be totally dismantled.) After a six minute countdown, participants rig their boat, sail across the cove, gather an egg and sail back to the launching beach. Eggs will contain messages that affect final standings.

Duck Race:

A race to find the best duck in the allotted time. Starting times will be handicapped based on racing experience. Ducks dictate the final standings.

Poker Race:

A series of buoys will be rounded, after each rounding each boat receives a card. Highest hand wins the race.

The only racing rules in place for these races will be that life-jackets are required on the boats and collisions are to be avoided. Janet Bodner (Ladies fleet captain) is the sole administrator of rules for this event. She can be reached for more information at 908-832-8953. Or j.bodner@att.net

New Member's Notes

Summer is in high gear and the sailing season is breezing along. This month the Liaison has received many questions, so rather than write one long column, I am responding to several questions of general interest.

Dear Liaison,

How do I get a boat storage spot at Spruce Run?

When you enter the park there is a right hand turn marked "Administration". This turn is before you reach the tollbooth. Follow that road down to the park administration building. Once inside ask the folks behind the desk for an application for a boat storage spot. Spots can be bought for one or two boats, winter storage spots can also be purchased. Purchase of a boat storage spot includes a season pass to the park. If you only want a pass to the park this can be bought inside the building at the tollbooth. Simply tell the collector you want to purchase a pass, then go inside the building to speak to the folks. The state passes purchased at Spruce Run are good for all state parks. If you have a boat storage pass on your car or tow a boat you will be able to gain entry to the park even when the park is full.

Dear Liaison.

How do I find out about fleet events?

Each fleet at HSC has a fleet captain who can tell you about fleet events within HSC and can also advise you on regatta's and other events outside of HSC. Most fleets attend a Nationals event and there are many other regattas on the east coast to which fleet members can travel. Your fleet captain is also a good source of information regarding suppliers for boat parts and can advise you who the experts are (beside themselves) in the club for information on the fine points of sailing

your boat. Fleet captains are listed on the inside back cover of this newsletter. They will be happy to hear from you!

Dear Liaison,

How do I make my spinnaker fly?

Pray alot. Be totally determined that it is going to. In general - First, determine which side of the boat the pole is going on. If you usually just reach or run on the jib, the spinnaker will usually go up on the same side on which you 'fly' your jib. The pole should be on the other side. Clip one end of the spinnaker to the spinnaker sheet on the pole side of the boat (guy line). Put the topping lift in the middle of the pole and clip the other end of the pole to the mast. The skipper should then raise the spinnaker. Have both spinnaker sheets in your hands while this is being done. Also, as the skipper is doing this, set the guy line in the cleat on the deck. The set can be determined by the amount of resistance you feel in the spinnaker as it is being raised. The proper set will be at about a 90 degree angle from the windvane. Once the spinnaker is up pull on the free sheet until you achieve the shape you want in the spinnaker.

Adjusting the topping lift may help with this and can be done by either the crew or the skipper depending on how the boat is rigged. The spinnaker should not be too tight across the bottom, but should run out until it takes no more line and begins to curl at the leading edge. Fly the spinnaker so it is always just on the edge of curling. This will produce the fastest boat speed.

Sometimes when putting up the pole on the port side of the boat it may be easier to clip on the guy during or after the raising of the spinnaker. You can usually judge this by observing how fast the skipper jumps on the halyard when putting up the spinnaker. After some practice you and the skipper will be able to work simultaneously at raising and setting the spinnaker and can achieve a smooth set with minimal fuss.

Don't be afraid to try a spinnaker on your boat. It's not as difficult as it looks and contributes a lot to boat speed. Many people in the club have old spinnakers that can be used to learn on. If your boat is not currently rigged for a spinnaker ask your fleet captain for advice on how to do this.

There have been many articles written in more detail about spinnaker use, I would suggest reading these for more information. Your fleet captain may be able to point you in the direction of a good article. Also, spinnaker procedure differs slightly from boat to boat. Whatever works best for you is the way you should do it. Don't worry if you do it differently from the next boat

Sunday June 25th was a rather puffy day and we (Vim Einthoven and Art Roswell) decided that we would see just how bad the situation was. We went out on the lake and saw that it was a bit too puffy for us senior citizens. We decided to come about to go back on shore when a special puff with our name on it turned us over – even though we had loosened the sails! Although it has never happened in the 30 years that Art and Vim have been sailing the boat, this was the only time after capsizing, it turned turtle. All kinds of objects started to float. While Art grabbed the majority of the flotsam, Vim pulled the centerboard back in place. (Because the boat had turtled, the centerboard dropped.) Getting the boat up was a real hassle especially because Art was hanging on to the flotsam.

Lo and behold a crash boat with Art M. and Brent appeared. They took the debris that Art R. was holding and then hoisted him aboard. Vim was able to right the swamped boat and graciously Art M. and Brent towed us in to the dock. As we were sorting out our things, Art R. realized that his keys had disappeared out of his pocket.

Again lo and behold the same crash boat appeared at the dock with Vim's cap and Art R's floating keys!

With this saga, we want to thank Art Mohan and Brent Benson not only for the rescue, but also for the thoughtfulness of going out and looking for any other stuff that we may have lost. Finding Art's keys saved a huge amount of hassle.

We should point out that it was Art and Brent's idea to have an *additional* crash boat with them because of the windy conditions. This is an example of being a responsible race committee.

SUNFISH SAIL SET SUBSTITUTE

The sail sets on older Sunfish become very brittle with age and usually fall apart when taking a sail off the spars such as when you remove it to have a window installed, etc. An inexpensive solution follows. From Wal Mart purchase 50 feet of 1/8' nylon line for \$1.97. Cut 10" lengths and singe ends with a handy candle flame. Tie an overhand knot at one end and run through a sail grommet, around spar and back through grommet from OPPOSITE side. Tie second overhand knot in part of line protruding; you now should have an overhand knot on EACH side of grommet. Adjust knot so that sail is ¼ inch from spar. Cost has been reduced from 75 cents each to less than 4 cents. I do not recommend this for serious racers as all those little knots can create drag.

Also at Wal Mart, you will find 3/16" non-stretch line, which is now the norm (28') for a Sunfish halyard and boom vang, priced at \$4.97 per 100 feet.
