HSC well represented at the 1999 Albacore Nationals and Internationals Rehobeth Delaware

The Hunterdon Sailing Club Albacore fleet performed exceptionally well during the rigorous and highly competitive Albacore National and International Competition this past October in Rehobeth Delaware where erratic winds and tough international competition made the event a real challenge to our highly talented fleet.

Brian Mohan (#4717) made good use of his boat, excellent sailing abilities and sharp tactical knowledge to baffle his competition and come home from the Nationals with a 5th place trophy in the Challenger Division. An outstanding performance.

Courtney Young (#6898) overcame equipment difficulties that would have devastated a less resourceful sailor, including being on the receiving end of one very nasty collision with an apparently blind Canadian boat. Courtney was his usual self out on the water, dodging in and out of the pack, working the angles and consistently ending up quite high in the rankings for both the Nationals and the Internationals.

Art Mohan (#6768), constant Sea Daddy that he is, used every drop of his saintly patience and charity in assisting his beleaguered crew in shaking a pernicious streak of bad luck that had plagued the poor fellow all year. Art sacrificed a centerboard, a set of wet weather gear, four water bottles and about 50 places in this desperate battle of exorcism. He overcame difficulties of biblical proportions, including two collisions to finally shake the bad juju. Victorious over the "Curse of the Happy Hurricane" in the final two days of competition Art captained his boat to several respectable finishes.

When not on the water or making repairs on the beach the HSC fleet was out and about enjoying the local scene. The Albacore class knows how to party, and being an international class we were often out and about with an eclectic bunch of English and Canadian sailors - funny accents and great company. All that and the gracious hospitality of Joan Mohan and splendid company of Nancy Young made the weeklong event a great success.

PROTESTS


All protesting boats will be required to display code flag "B" when protesting another boat. Protesting boats shall inform the RC of the protest when finishing that race.

RC Assignments



The Consequences of Mushy Compliance As seen in the Wayfarer Skimmer

- ? We don't know who sailed better, the guy in front complying with 98 percent of the rules, or the guy behind complying with 100 percent.
- Even minor cheating is like setting back our bathroom scale or lying to our psychiatrist. It deludes us with false satisfaction and diminishes our motivation to improve. Yet only by "improving" can we feel like winners regardless of where we finish.
- ? Sailors who are allowed to oil their way out of penalties will continue to endanger others with maneuvers like barging, tacking too close and port /starboard crossings.
- A skipper who excuses another's infringement cheats the rest of the fleet just as the infringer does. When the unpenalized infringer continues in a position he doesn't belong in, he impedes unfairly all who must then dip his stern, eat his bad air or even yield to him at a mark. In addition, everyone he then "beats" is scored one place below where they beling. And the extra point could be important to someone later in the series.
- ? Besides diminishing the quality of racing for everyone else, the cheater also deprives himself of the opportunity to do what is right, which can be quite ennobling. The is especially true if no one else noticed the infraction.

Dear Mr. Fix It: How do I refinish the rudder and dagger board on my Sunfish?

You can do it two ways. Either way you pick use high quality UV resistant varnish such as Schooner Varnish or Spar Varnish.

You really get what you pay for when it comes to varnish.

- 1. Sand all existing weathered or peeling varnish with 220 grit or higher sandpaper. Make sure to "feather" the edges.
- 2. Then apply several coats of UV varnish.

or....

- 1. Strip the entire piece with a paint remover. Make sure to do the whole thing not just part of it. This will darken the wood a little.
- 2. If you want the wood in "as new" condition apply a diluted mix of wood restorer to lighten the color of the wood.
- 3. Sand the entire piece with 220 or higher grit sandpaper.
- 4. Apply several coats of UV varnish keeping a wet edge.

I have always used the high price Interlux Schooner Varnish with excellent results on both my sunfish and wooden canoe.




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
