WHAT"S THAT STUFF GROWING NEAR THE BOAT LAUNCH?

Once again, your State Liaison Committee is right on top of things water wise! But in this case, we're ALL on top of none other than the dreaded EURASIAN WATER-MILFOIL, an exotic aquatic plant introduced into the country over a century ago for use in aquariums (!) and now found choking the shores of MANY US lakes, including NJ lakes.

A rare occurrence at Spruce Run, the plant is a shallow water monster, each bushy shoot can grow several inches a day, preferring 3 to 5 foot depths, continued on page 2

clear water to allow sunlight through, and it's 2 foot long strands love to ride on centerboards and rudders and get wound around propellers. Some believe it can be introduced to a lake by boats and fishing gear, but this doesn't answer the question of why we haven't seen it in 40+ years.

Representing HSC and The Friends of Spruce Run at the August meeting of the NJ Water Supply Authority, the group responsible for the water in Spruce Run, I referred to the weed not as a problem, but as an inconvenience. We discussed possible solutions which included mechanical harvesting, chemical treatment, introduction of voracious weevils, and lowering the water level 8 to 10 feet during the winter.

To me as a newcomer, winter lowering has merit, including low cost In fact the great job the NJWSA has been doing for the past several years in maintaining high water levels, even in winter, may have inadvertently encouraged the proliferation of the weed!

Subsequently, Becky Williams-Ellis, our favorite State Park Superintendent

(srrasupt@earthlink.net), together with Henry Patterson and Amy Shallcross from the NJWSA, toured the milfoil areas last week. Later Becky talked with the Supt. at Swartswood Lake, where the milfoil battle has been ongoing for ten years, and she will be sending studies and control methods tried. She also said that broken pieces of milfoil SHOULD NOT be left in the water or on boats because they can float away and start a new mass. (that would seem to remove harvesting from the list of possible remedies!)

Lucy's Jet NAC Report

I don't normally sail a Jet, but with the help of Elliot Zimmerman, Doug Brown, and my dad, we received a two week crash course in skippering so my brother and I could sail in the Junior Nationals. At Spruce Run we practiced almost every day trying to learn all the boat maneuvers including learning how to hoist, fly, and take down the spinnaker. On one totally windless day we even practiced numerous capsizes, which turned out to be extremely useful. By the end of two weeks it almost seemed like we knew what we were doing.

We arrived a day early to practice more before the junior races. The wind was about 8-10 knots and it gave me a chance to get used to the huge motorboats speeding through the channel, something we don't have on Spruce Run. Racing started on Wednesday, it was very windy in the morning and I was reluctant to race. Most of the lighter teams were reluctant as well. The races were postponed for the morning until some of the heavier teams managed to talk the rest of us into going out and getting it over with as the wind did not seem to be dying. 5 junior teams left the dock for the races. The wind was 13-18 with gusts over 20 knots. Four boats started the first race and 3 managed to complete all 5 races. My brother and I had a rather disastrous first race. We flipped with 30 seconds to the gun and had a hard time righting the boat because it was so windy. All the rest of our races were sailing very cautiously, with very careful gybes. It seemed like we were going over every time we went downwind. Caleb and Nathan had the best capsize of the day though. They attempted to put up their spinnaker on one of the last down wind legs and crashed spectacularly. The final standings were the Japikses in first, Caleb and Nathan in second and my brother and I one point behind in third. Not bad for ridiculous amounts of wind and two weeks in the jet.

The next day during the first open races the wind had lightened a little bit, but was still pretty windy. My brother was crewing for my dad, Caleb and Nathan were still sailing together, and I was sailing with Todd Lochner. Todd had sent out an email looking for crew for nationals and my dad had volunteered me to crew for him. I was learning how his boat worked on the way out to the races. We did pretty well our first race, other than us fouling someone and our hiking stick breaking. We still managed to come in 7th. Our second

race did not go to well. Our hiking stick broke again from our electrical tape repair. We auto tacked and half capsized our boat, filling it with water but not falling out. We were bailing as fast as we could but water was pouring in over the transom because we were sunk so low. We also couldn't find the tape to repair the tiller again but I, being supercrew, pulled out my tape so we could fix the tiller extension. We eventually got moving enough for the bailers to begin working and we sailed out of it in roughly one piece. We also managed to catch a few boats before the finish. The rest of the days races were rather uneventful and we placed 11th for the day. My dad's day didn't go as well as he had hoped. In the 2nd race he broke his jib halyard while rounding the leeward mark in 5th place. Caleb and Nathan had a pretty good day finishing all the races and not going swimming. Fridays sailing was postponed due to poor weather in the morning and when we left the docks in the afternoon the wind had died considerably. We got one good race in and then a huge storm rolled in and flipped many of the boats. Some of the gusts were over 30 knots. We were one of the first to get hit but we didn't flip. Todd kept the boat mostly under control for the wild planing ride back to the docks.

Saturday was another nice day. Although we were dodging motor boats all day, we got three good races in. We had the awards ceremony with Brent Barbehenn winning with a huge lead. Todd and I came in 11th mostly due to Todd's skill and patience dealing with a newbie crew. My dad and Simon finished 17th, and Caleb and Nathan were top juniors in 23rd. When we drove home that afternoon we were all exhausted but happy, and hopeful about going next year.

HSC's Courtney Young Wins Force 5 North American Championship

Courtney Young, Tom Oryniak and Ray Buchanan represented HSC at the NACs in New London, CT on August 16-18. What follows is the daily report provided to the editor:



Day 1: Light air. Local sailor Tom Welsh sets the pace with three firsts and a third. Weeds slowed those who didn't keep their boards clear. HSC's Ray Buchanan takes a third place in first race. By race four, the current was running 2 knots, forcing sailors to "overstand" the lay line by 20-25 boatlengths in order to round clearly. Courtney failed to do so.

Day 2: Tom Welsh slips into second place behind Peter Young, who scores 2 firsts and a 4th.

Day 3: The day of excitement and challenge. Sailors work with local club members to retrieve beached boats that had slipped their moorings in night time wind. An early start was planned, as race committee hopes that the 35 knot gusts would lessen. No such luck.

Only seven sailors dared to venture out for the last two races (#8&9.) Peter Young was winning #8, headed for the downwind finish.

While screaming on a plane in big waves and 30 knot wind, he was hit with "the big gust."

Capsized, broke mast, cut head and drifted across the line in 3rd place.

Then headed if for a trip to the hospital and six stitches. Tom Welch is still in contention, but fouls Courtney. Drops to 5th after penalty turns. Courtney wins race, day and regatta by 1 point over Peter, and 4 points over Tom.


